

INTERVIEW WITH BILL GATELY

WRITER: MIRIAM NAQUI PH: REEF KEEPERS AOUARIUM Reef Keepers Aquarium is a tropical fish and coral store located in Clayton, North Carolina. Its owner and proprietor, Bill Gately, is one of Hobbs Properties' long time tenants. The establishment, which houses a 18-20 year old coral system across 2000 gallons in 3 tanks as well as a stocked pond, has been located in the same Hobbs Properties building since its original inception in 2004.

Reef Keepers isn't just a business-it's the beautiful showcase of the work and care of a dedicated hobbyist who's kept aquariums for almost three decades. Bill received his first fish tank at the age of 15, from his best friend at the time. This young man already had a collection of them at his parents' home, and the


purchase of another was just one too many—he didn't have a place to put it.

"He offered it to me, and that was the beginning of it," said Bill. "[I] paid \$100 to him for it in 1982."

From that one gesture, a dedicated aquarist was born in Bill, who became enamored with the beauty of fish and corals and the symbiotic relationships within their ecosystems. He maintained that interest through a successful career in the automotive paint business, where he became a field tech and taught others the ins and outs of the art. But after 15 years of that and its associated health issues, he decided it was time for a change of career.

20 years into running his hobby-turnedbusiness, Mr. Gately offers something unlike any other shop in Clayton.

"What I brought to the area and what I have in the store is pretty amazing, if anybody wants to come see. Different from your average fish store. When you walk into my store, you get to see my coral reef. Literally 20 years old, never been broken down, never crashed. They are a living ecosystem. Most of my competitors, their stuff is torn down on a three month basis trying to keep them alive. Little understanding of what it takes to run these things. For me, it's sad, because you do see all the killing of the animals, and it drives me nuts."

Unlike many similar businesses, which rely on a constant turnover of stock to keep the cash coming in, his operating costs are kept low through the sheer quality of his craft. This makes it a

simpler matter to manage dry spells, including the COVID lockdowns that drove many small enterprises out of business.

"Keeping animals alive keeps me in business," Mr. Gately said. "If they don't sell, they grow, and then those corals I can break up into smaller pieces, and it's a sustainable business. Because I can keep them alive and grow them, I don't have to continue to bring them in. From a fish point of view, I'll bring in a 2000 dollar fish to sell because I'm not fearful of killing it. If it takes me a year to sell it,

then he'll stay in my fish system for a year. So, I'm not losing money. I'm not price related, I'm quality related."

The well-maintained coral systems sustain the health of the animals, many of which are approaching 20 years old themselves, and some of which are Mr. Gately's original fish from his first saltwater tanks.

It's a far cry from other suppliers, where a fish purchased might be ill or doing poorly in a sick system, only to eventually die after purchase if not rehabilitated fast enough by its new owner.

"The new hobbyists may not see initially the value of what I'm offering, but once they find several fish die in a row (from other sellers), I become interesting," Mr. Gately commented. He made special mention of an epaulette shark he sourced for a buyer. The shark was obtained as a

pup and sold, but after the shark outgrew the tank in his new home, the original buyer donated the animal back to Bill. The shark is still thriving in the pond at the back of the store, alive and well, and now going on 15 years old. Other inhabitants of the pond include puffers, tangs, antheas, and angelfish.

When asked for tips for new potential aquarium owners, Bill said: "Make sure it's something you're invested in, something you want. \rightarrow

shops since Hawaii legally banned the collection of ornamental fish in 2018. "The bandit is a very interesting, beautiful fish that I've been obsessed with the whole time I've been in the hobby," he said, and when asked why he liked the bandit in particular he added, "I guess the pattern and the coloring of the fish, which is kind of funny because it's just white and black. When you see the fish, you know exactly why they call it a bandit angel."

Outside of maintaining his reef and selling fish and aquarium supplies, Bill also does a few tank installations each year for customers, with the largest he's ever done being a couple thousand gallons. One thing he doesn't do is come out to do tank maintenance after the fact. The responsibility of maintaining the delicate ecosystem is a core part of the joy and privilege of owning an aquarium, and a key part of being invested.

→ "If you don't want it, it's not going to work out, you're going to struggle." He recommended freshwater tanks for beginners, as even a small saltwater tank will realistically cost close to a \$1000 investment. For those willing to make that investment, though, one can have the singular pleasure of keeping some of the most beautiful fish and corals. That these treasures of the seabeds can be observed and admired in person at any time is a treasure in itself.

Bill's oldest fish are two angelfish: a king angel, and a bandit-or banded-angel, which has become very rare to see in


